## Objectives


Basing its work on the principle established by the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC), the Lombardy Regional Board of Psychologists (OPL) conducted its "Psychology for Children's Rights" project in 2016 with the aim of clearly and incisively studying and disseminating the responsibilities, competencies and organisation of psychologists' work in the area of children's rights. Starting from our knowledge of the current state of application of the CRC in Italy (based on the ninth monitoring report on the Convention on the Rights of the Child in Italy 2015 - 2016), the association focused specifically on the way the "children's rights and psychologists" topic is represented in society within the Lombard professional community. In this work, we present the main results of explorative research in collaboration with UNICEF, Save The Children, AIAF Associazione Italiana Avvocati di Famiglia Lombardia "Milena Pini" and Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore di Milano, aimed at determining the level of knowledge and application of the CRC by psychologists working in facilities dealing with minors in Lombardy.

## Phases and methodology - The research was divided into three phases


Through our analysis of databases and existing conventions with public institutions in Lombardy, we identified 1400 residential facilities in order to determine how many psychologists work in these facilities dealing with minors.






Based on our analysis of the data we collected by contacting the facilities, we estimated that a professional psychologist is present in only 50% of these facilities.


We interviewed a sample of 157 psychologists working in facilities with minors using a brief questionnaire, in order to determine the area and sector of operation, training, knowledge of children's rights legislation and literature.







Another important datum showed that 8.78% have a Master's degree in children's rights, 18.92% have attended unstructured courses, 35.14% have acquired training through field experience, 1.35% have received training abroad, and just 35.81% have received other forms of training.






In the third phase, we obtained the following data on knowledge of the CRC, update reports on its monitoring in Italy and optional protocols. This was confirmed by experience with minors and the sharing of data with other stakeholders forming the Children's Rights Protection System.


Following the questions asked in the focus groups, we found that 100%

of the sample interviewed believed they required more training on the CRC, acknowledging it to be an essential tool for psychologists.

Through the focus groups, we discussed further the areas and types of work done by the psychologists







#### DISCUSSION OF THE RESULTS

The results show that knowledge of children's rights is lacking and distributed heterogeneously throughout Lombardy, despite representing an essential and guiding reference tool for our colleagues' work in the field, as explicitly established by the CRC. When considered against the Italian reality of a country hard at work and at the forefront of receiving unaccompanied minors, the results of our research strengthen our determination to develop knowledge and expand cross-disciplinary skills on children's rights both inside and outside our profession.

The focus groups revealed that, in addition to the aforementioned need for education, another very important element is the need to improve the dialogue between professionals working in the field, local facilities and institutions working with minors and families, in order to form a regional and national protection system where the value and specific nature of psychologists' work is acknowledged and valued for their specific skills and their contribution to the fulfilment of the principles expressed in the CRC.
